Girls Inc. of Chattanooga offers **in-school and after school programs** centered around academic enrichment, healthy living, and life skills. Our research-based programs are intended to change the statistics, providing girls the opportunity to explore, grow, and succeed.







Girls Inc. offers **seasonal camps** for girls ages 5-18 during Hamilton County *fall, spring, and summer breaks*.

Our seasonal camps provide hands-on experiences, spark curiosity, and simulate a sense of adventure, empowering participants to build confidence, gain exposure to a variety of cultures and careers, and leave with meaningful connections and experiences that support their long-term development.



### The Bookworm Club: 1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> grades

An **after school program** focused on the five fundamental building blocks of literacy. The program aims to inspire confidence, proficiency, and a love for reading and writing.

## Club LIT(eracy): 4<sup>th</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> grades

On May 8, 2025, we proudly celebrated 21 years of UnBought & UnBossed (UBUB), a milestone that marked not just the longevity but the evolution of this signature event. In its second year as an evening event, it brought energy and excitement while honoring phenomenal women. Staying true to our tradition of recognizing phenomenal women, we presented the Sole Award in four distinguished areas: Advocacy, Education, STEM-Medicine, and Sports. These honorees serve as role models, inspiring girls to dream boldly and lead with purpose.

UnBought and UnBossed is more than just an event; it's a tribute to the spirit and determination of the late Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm. Chisholm was the first African American woman elected to Congress in 1968 and the first woman and African American to seek the democratic party nomination for President of the United States in 1972. Chisholm declared herself a representative of all people and was committed to serving as a leader who would remain "Unbought and Unbossed."


